
# **Small Group Discussion Questions**

### TITLE: Burden of Proof - Part 1, Rise Up and Build

**MEMORY VERSE:** So it was, when I heard these words, that I sat down and wept, and mourned for many days; I was fasting and praying before the God if heaven. Nehemiah 1:4

#### **SERMON REFLECTIONS**

- 1) In the sermon, we learned that Nehemiah was a <u>leader</u> with <u>vision</u>. Please define the word leader (Nehemiah 3). Please define the word vision (Genesis 15:1, Isaiah 1:1, Daniel 1:17, Acts 2:17). How would you explain vision to a non-believer? The significance of a vision is not the size of the vision, but that it is from God. Has God ever given you a vision?
- 2) In the sermon, we learned about Nehemiah's burden birthing a powerful prayer life...why? Define the word burden. What significance does Prayer have with burden? (Acts 10:2-4, Acts 11:5)?
- 3) What is np3?

### **CLOSER WALK**

Because of the importance of the next few months, we are going to be digging deeper into Nehemiah each week.

#### Nehemiah 1

A quick history lesson:

The Jews survived a narrow escape when God intervened during Isaiah's day and slew 185,000 Assyrians. This gave them a brief respite. However, in 586 BC, Neb destroyed Jerusalem, leveling it and burning it to the ground – he also transported the citizens that were left to Babylon. After 70 years (as God had said it would be), Cyrus, the king of the Medes and Persians, who Isaiah spoke of 150 years before he was born, was impressed when Daniel showed him the scroll of Isaiah where he was alluded to and allowed those who wanted to return to do so. However, only about 50,000 left to go back – the others had "blended in." Under the leadership of Ezra and Zerubbabel, this group was able to rebuild the temple but not the wall, and the wall was strategic for autonomy and protection. This brings us to the time of Nehemiah.

Have your Small Group read verse by verse through Nehemiah 1 this week and reflect on the following questions.

- 1. How was Nehemiah similar to Joseph, Esther, and Daniel?
- 2. Look up the meaning of the name Nehemiah how does that relate to this chapter?
- 3. How was Nehemiah DETERMINED? In this chapter were his action steps?
- 4. When God puts a burden on your heart what should you do? What did Nehemiah do?
- 5. Have you ever had a burden for anything? What do you have a burden for today?
- 6. Read the following passages so you can understand the depth of the Jews love for Jerusalem and why Nehemiah's heart was broken when he received the news concerning its current condition. Psalm 48, 79, 84, 87.
- 7. Nehemiah was a man of prayer. In Chapter 1 we have the first of 12 prayers. Be sure as you read through this book to highlight them we you come across them.
- 8. In verses 6-9, what is the greater part of Nehemiah's prayer devoted to? Also note for Nehemiah it was *we*, not they. What value is this for a leader?
- 9. What was Nehemiah's position?
- 10. Why did God allow his people to be taken captive?

Accept the CHALLENGE – get a journal and write out the book of Nehemiah!
