SMALL GROUP QUESTIONS - "THE REAL THING"

Last week I had the pleasure of shopping for my daughter's eighteenth birthday present. After many discussions with my wife we decided that we would get Candace a series of gifts (18 in all) to commemorate this important milestone in her life. After I made the commitment, I realized that eighteen gifts could threaten the very balance of our already tight yearly budget, so I quickly moved to negotiate where we would look for her presents. We started out at the mall. I immediately determined, after the first couple of gifts if we stayed on this pace, Candace's college fund would be in serious jeopardy (especially due to the fact that we had to fill up at the gas station on the way there)! Finally, in a moment of divine inspiration God spoke these words into my mind: "The Kobey's Swap Meet." I don't know if you've ever had the pleasure of shopping at an outdoor flea market, but I can truly recommend the experience. This gathering is the greatest example of "One man's trash is another man's treasure" principal on this earth. I was fascinated by the heated negotiations that rivaled the intensity of someone you might find on Wall Street. This place had everything, especially if you're in the market for fakes and knock-offs. Where else in the world can you buy a Prada bag, and Dolce & Gabana sunglasses all for under ten dollars? When I asked one of the vendors where all these knockoffs came from, I was quickly corrected with the proper term, that these goods were not fakes but merely replicas (I guess you can get around branding laws if you call your items replicas rather than advertising them as the real things). What was even more amazing was the fact that most of these products actually looked pretty good. Now I admit that I'm no handbag expert, but these items seemed to be an answer to my fiscal prayers; designer bags at swap meet prices. I had found heaven!

Unfortunately my Shangri-la experience was about to come to a quick end. While I was rummaging through all this treasure, imagining how quickly we were going to fulfill our eighteen gift quest, a young lady came up and began comparing her bag with one of the replicas. It was obvious, even at some distance that her bag, was far superior to those I held in my greedy little arms. In fact, compared to the real thing my goods were cheap and not a worthy of a daughter whom I love so much. There are many in this world who would love to convince you that their explanation for humanity's inherent need to seek out a higher power, a source for our existence, and the meaning of life better fits the world, than the Bible's explanation for these truths. One thing's for sure that this universal quest for meaning outside ourselves is the most important journey a person can undertake. And depending on how you answer it, your life will unfold in radically different directions. If you conclude God doesn't exist or He is some impersonal force, or the sum of all creation, you'll undoubtedly avoid seeking a relationship with God of the Bible and will not attempt to honor, serve and obey and submit your life to Him as the Bible commands. The questions remain: "Is there a God?", "What is He like?", "Does He care?", and "How can I know Him?" just to name a few. My hope is that this small group session will help facilitate discussion that inspires every member of your group to take one step closer to discovering the truth about who God is.

Getting Started

Think back when you were a kid. What did you believe about god during those years? Then take some time discussing how your view have changed over the years.

What are some factors that have influenced your current beliefs about God?

Digging Deeper:

Throughout history there has been many theories suggested about the existence or the person of God:

- The *atheist* says no god or gods exist at all and the universe as we know it happened by chance with no intelligent designer.
- The agnostic says it's impossible to ascertain if there is a God, no one can know for sure.
- The *deist* says God created the universe and left it alone to fend for itself. He is uninterested in His creation
- The theist says God exists and want to be intimately involved with His creation
- The *polytheist* says many gods exist. A similar view subscribes to the belief that all pathways lead to God.
- The *pantheist* says that God exists in and through everything in the universe and he is one with the universe
- 1. Which of the views of God listed makes the most sense to you? Why?
 - a. Which of the previous positions about God are the most common belief among the people you know? Which is least popular?
- 2. What are some arguments do you commonly hear that defend their positions about God? To what extent do these arguments and other factors influence your own thinking about the existence of God?
- 3. Read Psalm 19:1-4 and Romans 1:19, 2:14-15. What does the complex nature of the universe and the fact the all humans seem to have a conscience say about God existence?
- 4. Imagine you are conducting a survey asking people what they think God is like? What are the most common characteristics they would mention?
- 5. The Bible describes God with a variety of pictures, symbols and words. Taken together they form a consistent picture of what God is like. Take some time looking up the following verses and the attributes that show us His nature:
 - a. *Omnipresent*--(Psalm 68:14; 2 Corinthians 6:18). He is always near; no place is further from Him than any other place and he is not limited to spatial dimensions.
 - b. *Omnipotent*—(Psalm 139:6-16). He can do anything that doesn't violate His nature; He's all powerful; nothing is impossible for Him; his power is unlimited nad only restricted by His choice
 - c. *Omniscient*—(Job 37:16; 1 John 3:20). He knows everything; nothing is hidden; nothing goes unnoticed; nothing I beyond his ability to grasp.
 - d. *Sovereign*—(Daniel 4:25; Romans 9:15-23). He is the ultimate ruler of the universe; no one has greater power or authority than Him.
 - e. *Eternal*—(Isaiah 40:28; Colossians 1:15-17). He has always been and will always be. He had no beginning and will have no end; He is creator of time; but not subject to it but rules over time.
 - f. *Immutable*—(Deuteronomy 32:4; Psalms 102:7). He doesn't change; He isn't getting better or worse; His attributes can't diminish; He's perfect for eternity.
 - g. *Infinite*—(1 Kings 8:27; Job 11:7-9). he is unlimited; He can't be measured and he is inexhaustible in every aspect of His being.
 - h. Holy—(Habakkuk 1:13). He's pure; He's morally perfect and without fault: He can't sin.
 - i. Wise—(James 3:15-18). He uses His knowledge skillfully; His counsel should be trusted.
 - j. *Good*—(Zephaniah 3:17; Romans 11:35). He has no evil' can do no evil. He constantly works for the benefit of His creation; he can be trusted with our well-being.

- k. *Just*—(Romans 2:6; 11:6; Galatians 2:6). He's fair, he doesn't tolerate unrighteousness; He will make sure every wrong will be made right; he's impartial
- 1. *Loving*—(Jeremiah 31:3; 1 John 4:7-8). Sacrifice is in His nature; he cares; He gives; He serves: He works to bring about what we need: He compassionate; He's sensitive and we matter to Him.
- 6. Which of the following attributes listed grab your attention more than others? Explain why.
- 7. It's one thing to believe that the God described in the Bible exists, and quite another to let that belief impact your life. What changes would you have to make for God to make a difference in your life?

Ask your group to check the statement(s) below that best describes their belief at this point in their lives.

I'm not sure I believe that the way the Bible describes God is really accurate.
My concept of God is somewhat different from the god depicted in this session.
