COMMUNITY GROUP QUESTIONS — THE SOURCE, PART SIX

Study Introduction:

The reality and fulfillment of Abraham's blessings in Genesis was never fully realized in his lifetime. His life has an interesting plot. He was removed from his father and his culture (Gen. 12), travelled into dangerous contexts such as Egypt, Sodom, and other lands (Gen. 13, 14, 18-20), given the covenant through circumcision (Gen. 17), has an extra marital affair with Hagar (Gen. 16), gives birth to two sons that will polar opposite outcomes (Gen. 16, 21), and so much more. Paul states Abraham is the "father of faith in Rom. 4, yet if we study his life slowly we may come to a different conclusion.

What does this mean? How has Abraham established this life of faith? In relation to our topic and study at hand, how did he receive the blessing, and what was the blessing? In Genesis we see God establishing the covenant with Abraham six different times (Gen. 12:1-3; 4, 5; 13:14-17; 15:1-21; 17:1-27; 22:15-18), and every one of those times confirm that the "blessing" is a future reality, not temporal. Of course, Abraham received wealth, and landed in the plush land of Canaan, but the blessing always referred to the covenant of God making Abraham a great and mighty nation. As we continue to read the Old Testament we see the covenant reaffirmed in three different ways:

- 1. The promise of land in the Palestinian Covenant (Deut. 30:1-10)
- 2. The promise of kingly descendants in the Davidic Covenant (22 Sam. 7:12-16)
- 3. The promise of blessing in the "Old" and "New" Covenants (Ex. 19:3-6; Jer. 31:31-40)

Based on these three affirmations of the covenant, it still hasn't been fulfilled, but is still a future reality. This reality finally meets its climax in the arrival of Jesus into the world, and is finally fulfilled in his death, resurrection and ascension (Heb. 8).

In our application of the "The Source" of all blessings, this helps us to put into perspective what blessings will look like from God's perspective. It will also help us in understanding what is God's best in our lives today as we prepare for his eminent return someday. Let's look at one perspective [of many] potential perspectives of what the "blessing" could look like in Revelation 21-22. If you are used to reading Revelation from a strictly apocalyptic perspective stop reading it that way and look at it from the promise that we are of the chosen of the groom, his bride, that will dwell with him forever (Rev. 19:6-8).

Study Questions:

- 1. Read Rev. 21:1-8 and Rev. 22 together as a group. Identify the key concepts that John mentions that will happen after God establishes his eternal reign:
 - > There will be a new heaven and new earth.
 - A new holy city, Jerusalem, is coming down from heaven.
 - ➤ God is establishing an eternal dwelling place amongst his people.
 - ➤ He will remove all sin, pain, sickness, and death forever.
 - ➤ God establishes he is the "beginning and the end" and he will be the eternal life source for all whom are his bride.
 - In the midst of this throne establishment he will separate those who are his bride and those who are not.
 - God declares the goodness of the earth to supply life, and the he alone sustains it, in our very presence.
 - We will see his face and we will worship him forever out of awe and adoration for his good name and glory.
 - Jesus will reign in glory at his coming!



- 2. Based on your reflection of these two passages, how do you think our time in the "new heaven and new earth" will be spent? What will we be doing? How does that sound to you?
 - Compare with Genesis 2:4-24, what does Adam and Eve do in the garden? If we affirm that Adam and Eve were dwelling in perfection before the fall (Gen. 3), will we be doing the same thing after he establishes his reign forever in Rev. 21-22?
- 3. When you think of "blessings" or "rewards" what is usually the first thing that comes to mind? What is usually the last thing that comes to mind? What is your reflection of the "blessing" theme, and how have you been wrestling and praying through that over the last 6 weeks?
 - ➤ Keep in mind the central theme of Jesus as the eternal blessing. Allow the discussion to break through the typical financial reward blessing that is pervasive in our culture, and try to move past that into an eternal blessing mindset.
 - Remember Abraham only partly received the "blessing" by the birth of his son Isaac, but the true blessing was going to climax in the birth of Christ. Our blessings can be right now, and often he does bless us right now, but it doesn't always come in the form that we may think.
