	The Catholic tradition offers the false hope of to cleanse unforgiven sins while the Bible teaches that Jesus alone is the forgiver of all sin.	Heolews 7.27
	Catechism #1030: "All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation, but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven."	
	This process of purification occurs in a place designated by the Catholic Church as purgatory.	

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
