1. Korah <u>puffs</u> himself up before man but Moses casts Numbers himself down before God.

A spiritual leader receives leadership from God and does not take it from man.

A spiritual leader leads people to the foot of the cross.

3. Korah devalue God's assignment and Moses honors it. Numbers 16:8-11

Spiritual leaders honor God's assignments for their lives.

- **4.** Korah focused on himself but Moses' focus was the <u>people</u>. Numbers 16:12-27 *A spiritual leader loves the people he/she leads more than the people love him.*
- 5. Korah's pride destroyed him while Moses humility Numbers 16:28-35 brought him honor.

A spiritual leader understands the level of intimacy with God necessary for effective leadership.

Homework Questions

Bring this with you to small group this week.

- 1. We get messages from every part of our culture that tell us to look our and protect ourselves. How is this contrary to what God expects of us? Can you identify specific ad slogans that send messages that help us to justify our disobedience?
- 2. As we begin to "dig in," start to consider an area of your life where God is asking you to stop justifying your disobedience and start simply obeying no matter how much you feel you are entitled to do things the way you want.
- Consider Ruth in Ruth 1:1-18. Ruth followed the decrees God set forth for His people, even when she might have been – from the world's perspective - justified to do things differently.
 - d. Based on her behavior, what do you think was the most important thing to Ruth?
 - e. In what way was she given an "out" to obeying God? Ultimately, what did she do?
 - f. What can we learn from Ruth's example about obeying God, rather than justifying what we think we deserve?
- 4. Read Mark 14:1-9. In this passage, Jesus disciples justify their opposition to this women's behavior.
 - g. What was the basis for their opposition? Does their opposition seem justifiable?
 - h. What was Jesus reply?
 - i. What is the message Jesus sent to them and ultimately, to us?
