THE ROYAL Book Six: Letters, Chapter 1 Phillippians 1 Pastor Miles McPherson – November 7, 2010



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GENRE: Epistles – Read like a letter.

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1. Epistles make up 21 of the 27 books of the New Testament (NOTE: All New Testament books are epistles except for the four gospels, Acts and Revelation).
Epistles were written to either a group or an individual for a specific occasion.
3. Epistles were written to address issues in the century church.
4. Epistles usually address one of four issues:
 a. Behavior needing <u>correction</u> b. Warning against false teachings c. Misunderstanding between author and audience. d. Encouragement
5. Epistles cannot mean to us now what it did not mean to them then.
Epistles Reading Rules. Read the entire epistle 2-3 times and answer 5 questions:
Read: Philippians 1
1. Who wrote the epistle? <i>Answer</i> : Paul (Philippians 1:1)
2. To whom was it written? <i>Answer</i> : Saints in Philippi (Philippians 1:1)
3. Why was it written or what issue or conflict caused the letter to be written? <i>Answer:</i> To thank the saints (Philippians 1:3-57). Encourage unity (1:27-28, 2:1-2).
4. What does the author say about that issue that caused the letter to be written? <i>Answer:</i> Be unified (Philippians 1:27-28).

Read and discover what God communicated to the people *then*.

Read: Philippians 1:27-30

Discover: Paul encourages the Philippians to be unified in their faith.

Using the guidelines below, here is a daily Bible text for you to READ, REFLECT and RESPOND.

▶ On Monday and Tuesday, read the whole letter through to get the "big picture." Then, for the rest of the week, zero in on each individual chapter.

MON – 1 Thessalonians 1-3 WED – 1 Thessalonians 1 FRI – 1 Thessalonians 3

TUE – 1 Thessalonians 4-5 THU – 1 Thessalonians 2 SAT – 1 Thessalonians 4

SUN – 1 Thessalonians 5



Read and discover what God communicated to the people at the time of the writing.

Read the text 2-3 times and identify either:

- 1. Who wrote the epistle?
- 2. To whom was it written?
- 3. Why was it written or what issue or conflict caused the letter to be written?
- 4. What does the author say about the issue that caused the letter to be written?
- 5. How does it relate to and challenge us today?



Reflect, pray and determine what is God communicating to us in the present.

Write, in your own words, a 2-3 sentence prayer or revelation identifying how this letter, written to a church in the first century, applies to us today.



Respond and do something!

Do something by praying and deciding what God wants to do in and through you in the future. Identify the steps of faith you need to take in order to facilitate God's promises. What am I going to do to apply my faith to be more of who God wants me to be? Is there sin to repent of? Is there something you can praise God for? Is there someone you need to forgive, serve or speak to? How are you worshiping God in your life?

Further applications – Send a challenge to people in your acquaintance. Be bold in what the Lord is showing you as a step of faith. Use social media to spread the Word of God (e.g. Facebook, Twitter, Blog, email, etc.).
