Genre: Apocalyptic (read it like fantasy)
Reading Rules: 1. Read the entire book 2 or 3 times and look for God's story of judgment on evil and His restoration of good.
2. Who is the vision being given to and on whose behalf is the vision being given? 2a. <i>Answer:</i> The vision is given to John on behalf of the 7 churches.
Revelation 1:4, 11
3. Determine whether the images and/or characters are acting on behalf of God or Satan.
3a. <i>Answer:</i> Jesus is acting on behalf of the Father. Revelation 5:5
4. Describe (in your own words and without making comparisons to contemporary events or objects) what the images and/or characters are doing or accomplishing.
4a. <i>Answer:</i> Jesus takes the scroll of <u>judgment</u> from the Father. Revelation 5:7
Four living creatures, 24 elders and countless angels worship Jesus as He takes the scroll from the Father while sitting on His throne.
5. How does this passage or scene fit God's overall story of eternal judgment and restoration?
5a. <i>Answer:</i> God the Father has <u>delegated</u> eternal judgment to Jesus. Revelation 5
6. How does the revelation impact your faithfulness to God? 6a. <i>Answer:</i> Since eternal judgment is in hands of Jesus, receive His loving offer
of <u>forgiveness</u> . John 3:16, 1 John 1:9

- 2. Who is the vision being given to and on whose behalf is the vision being given?
- 3. Determine whether the images or characters are acting on behalf of God or Satan.
- 4. Describe (in your own words and without making comparisons to contemporary events or people) what the images or characters are doing or accomplishing.
- 5. How does the passage or scene fit the overall story of God's final judgment and restoration?
- 6. How does the passage impact your faithfulness to God?



Reflect, pray and determine what is God communicating to us in the present.

Write, in your own words, a 2-3 sentence prayer or revelation identifying how this letter written to a church in the first century has application for us today.



Respond and do something!

Do something by praying and deciding what God wants to do in and through you in the future. Identify the steps of faith you need to take in order to facilitate God's promises. What am I going to do to apply my faith to be more of who God wants me to be? Is there sin to repent of? Is there something you can praise God for? Is there someone you need to forgive, serve or speak to? How are you worshiping God in your life?
